IF THEY DON'T FEAR ANYTHING IT IS BECAUSE....

One of the parents of the children from our school was telling me how stressful it is to keep children during holiday time. Why? I asked then she went on to lament how children of these days have no fear or self-restraint; it is better the children in Africa, they listen and they respect their parents.

When I returned home, I reflected on my own childhood and I asked myself 'how did our parents put in us the morality and behavior that makes us respectable persons today'?

Children are the most trustful people you will ever come across, they believe almost everything that their parents tell them. There are some interesting lessons that African parents tell their children in order to help them to maintain a certain behavior, to keep away from danger or to make them develop a character. Here are some examples:

In order to make children listen to their parents it was said that a child who notoriously did not listen to the parents will have the ears grow so big like of a rabbit and sag like the ears of sheep.

Africans used three stones to cook their food. They were to be kept clean. Not knowing whether a stone was hot or not, sitting on one could be dangerous; to prevent children doing so it was said that a mothers breasts would immediately disappear and the baby being breastfed die!

Children were taught to preserve the environment and to protect nature; for example to frighten them from destroying bird nests, breaking bird eggs or eating them it was said that a child who did so will have feathers grow inside his/her stomach.

In all African cultures it is forbidden for a father in law to have sexual relationship with the daughter in law the same applied to the mother in law with son in law. If someone went against that principle it was said that the body would get crippled and shake. People with Parkinson disease would be suspected of violating their in-laws. It was ignorance of course. Taboos protected our society and preserved the natural world that many tourists rush to enjoy. Taboos too defined the consequences of every behavior. It is amazing that people whose cultures we watch on the television as less educated, they have greater respect of persons and solidarity than you can imagine. If you think that your children are not afraid of anything may be you as a parent has never warned them of the consequences of their bad behavior. He who is not taught by his mother will be taught by the world.

Feast of SS Anne & Joachim: The parents of the Virgin Mary, according to tradition derived from certain apocryphal writings. Information concerning their lives and names is found in the 2nd-century-AD *Protevangelium of James* ("First Gospel of James") and the 3rd-century-AD *Evangelium de nativitate Mariae* ("Gospel of the Nativity of Mary"). According to these sources, Anne (Hebrew: Ḥannah) was born in Bethlehem, Judaea. She married Joachim, and, although they shared a wealthy and devout life at Nazareth, they eventually lamented their childlessness. Joachim, reproached at the Temple for his sterility, retreated into the countryside to pray, while Anne grieved by his disappearance and by her barrenness, solemnly promised God that, if given a child, she would dedicate it to the Lord's service. Both received the vision of an angel, who announced that Anne would conceive and bear a most wondrous child. The couple rejoiced at the birth of their daughter, whom Anne named Mary who is the Mother of Jesus.

Our parish Sisters belong to a Congregation which enjoys the matronage and protection of St Ann and derives their charism from St Ann who moulded and guided Mary their daughter to listen to the voice of God and adhere to his will. We pray for the Congregation of the Sisters of St Ann that they may be inspired by the life of St Ann, guide and mould the children and youth who are entrusted to their care through their ministry in the field of education, healthcare and social outreach.
