#### FEAR SHOULD REMIND US OF GOD'S PRESENCE

Science has not invented the techniques how to control the forces of nature. Hurricanes tornados, earthquakes, volcanos, tsunamis, droughts, fires; the list goes on, have destroyed lives just as we look on. Man's technology is nothing before these forces.

In Sacred Scriptures these forces natural as they are, also symbolise the turmoil that goes on in our relationship with God and with one another. In the first reading, Elijah had successfully proved that the God of Israel Yahweh, was the only living God. But his relationship with him seem to have gone bad. He felt so afraid. The terrifying events were meant not to destroy him but to make him realise that God was in the whole picture of what was going on.

All of us, like Elijah will have storms of life, they come to us in different forms; it might be sickness, or poverty, difficult relationships or any unresolved issues in life, yes we have these storms. Like Elijah we must remain calm when we are in such situation because when we do not let ourselves be taken away, we soon realise that God is not in evil things that threaten us. Had Elijah not first endured a mighty wind, an earthquake and fire, he may not have recognised the presence of the Lord in the gentle breeze.

In the gospel, the disciples are battling a heavy sea, confuse Jesus for a ghost, and watch Peter sinking as he tried to walk across the water. Most importantly they saw Peter stretching out his hands to Jesus as his only saviour. Jesus held him and the wind dropped.

The church of Christ will always sail in the midst of storms, there will be persecutions from within or from without, there will be divisions among believers, there will be scandals, yes, there will always be storms in the Church. Fear should remind us of God's presence. Without the storm, we do not appreciate the provider of calm. Like St. Peter we must cry to Jesus; Lord save us. When Jesus is not with us in our personal lives, in our family, in our communities or in the Church, we are bound to have storms.

The second reading calls on us be zealous for he salvation of others just as we are mindful of our own. St. Paul a Jew was so bothered that his fellow Jews had rejected Jesus Christ. This caused him mental anguish to remind us that the salvation of other people depends also on our zeal to catechise them or by giving them good example.

As you return home today, remember that we shall have difficulties of one kind or the other, but Jesus is at work watching over us. He tells us "It is I, do not be afraid" This is the assuring message of today that Jesus is with us even in the midst of our troubles.
