"IT WAS THE WOMEN WHO.....!"

Thanks to the women who opened their mouths to tell what they had seen and heard. What would the world look like if they had taken what they had seen or heard as a private matter! What would have happened if they joined the apostles in their hiding places instead of pulling them out through the streets of the city to go to the empty tomb! But the courage and determination of the women to tell what they had seen and heard in the garden where Jesus was buried has made the whole world to join in one song: "Alleluia the Lord is risen".

On Palm Sunday, I said that the Christians have no secrets, they told the story about Jesus just as it happened; he was betrayed by one of us, he was denied by our leader, he was handed over to the Romans by Caiaphas our High Priest, he failed the opinion polls conducted by the Roman governor to decide between him and Barabbas, he was stripped naked, he cried loud in pain and laughed at as he died painfully on the Cross. Even the tomb in which he was buried was borrowed! These are accounts that are not proclaiming a hero, but a loser. This gives us the proof of the authenticity of the historical events we started celebrating since Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and of course on Easter.

There was no witness when Jesus was rising from the dead. The reason was so that the resurrection may forever be an article of our faith. What we believe about Jesus, we believe it about ourselves, that like him we die; like him and with him we shall rise from death.

The first people to have noticed that the tomb was tempered with were the women, but someone who would be more convincing was missing. Mary the mother of Jesus was not among the women who went to the tomb early on the Sunday morning. If the Christians were fabricating the story of the resurrection, Mary the mother of Jesus would have been brought into the story.

The women did not claim Jesus was risen instead they talked of the body having been taken out of the tomb. Where could it be? Did Joseph of Arimathea change his mind? Did the Pharisees or the Roman soldiers dispose of it or the dogs dragged it away and ate it! The women were puzzled!

The arrival of Peter and John did not prove his resurrection instead it increased their fears. The linen cloth was lying on the ground and the cloth that had been over his head was rolled up in a place by itself. They lifted up the clothes scattered them side by side but the body of Jesus was not inside!

So, what does the resurrection of Jesus mean to you? For Peter and John it was a reminder to them of all the things that Jesus had spoken to them. Until this moment they had not fully understood who Jesus was, the empty tomb became an evidence. They saw and believed.

As you return home, let us remember that our Christian life must be like an empty tomb which publicly proclaims that the Lord is risen. We must hold nothing back. Secondly, faith in Jesus is not a private matter, like the women we must share it with others. Go home praising and thanking God for the gift of his resurrection and new life he now gives to us.

MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE

Divine Mercy Liturgy: will take place on Sunday 24th April starting at 2:00pm. Our parish is the centre of this devotion in Coventry City. Let us come together to call on the mercy of God upon us and upon the whole world. On Sunday 1st May 2022 we shall have a special priest guest from Poland Fr. Peter Prusakiewicz

CSMA a renowned preacher on Divine Mercy. He will preach at both Masses 9:30 & 11.30am.

<u>Traditional Easter Monday Mass:</u> will take place at St. Osburgs. There will not be Mass here at Easter Monday and in other parishes. We want to come together as a people of this city to celebrate easter together. Mass will start at 10:00am.

Coventry City Council has given £1505.00 pounds grant as a recognition to Monday Club in its recovery plan after Covid19. The money will be spent on the elderly of the parish who support each other through togetherness. This grant will not take away the obligation to make little contribution towards the expenses they incur but it will subsidise it. I ask the elderly of our communities around to come and spend two hours every Monday as a way of socializing and sharing our experiences.

<u>Wedding bells</u> will sound for John Patrick Gibbons (Jnr) and Miss Caitlin Jane O'Hara on Saturday 23rd April 2022 at 12:00noon. We congratulate and wish them all the best in their life together.

Easter: following an ancient tradition, the Church keeps vigil for the Lord, at which the faithful carry lighted lamps, as if looking for the Lord when He returns. The ceremony begins after nightfall and must end before daybreak. Even though it be celebrated before midnight, this is a Paschal Mass of the Resurrection. On the third day after his Crucifixion and Death, after the Shabbat, at dawn on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to the tomb of Jesus. They found the tomb empty and the stone rolled away (Mt. 28:6).

Easter is linked to the Jewish Passover and the Exodus from Egypt recorded in the Old Testament through the Last Supper According to the New Testament, Jesus gave the Passover meal a new meaning, in the Upper Room during the Last Supper he prepared the disciples for his death. He identified the unleavened bread and cup of wine as his body soon to be sacrificed and his blood soon to be shed.

The Resurrection of Christ is the fruit of his obedience to God's will. St Paul write: "He humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross. Therefore God has highly exalted him." (Phil 2:8-11).

Hednesford Pilgrimage Returns in July. On Sunday 3 July, for the first time since 2019, we are able to invite people from all over the Archdiocese to join us for the Annual Pilgrimage in honour of Our Lady of Lourdes, hosted at the Diocesan shrine at Our Lady of Lourdes, Hednesford near Cannock in Staffordshire.
