#### **DIVINE ATTITUDE**

Lake Victoria which is found between 3 countries Uganda, Kenya and Tanzania, is the second largest fresh water lake on planet earth. It is said to have existed there for millions of years with stunning beauty. One day, a bad person introduced into it a very bad weed, called the water hircin. The weed floats on water and it can travel miles in a single day. It is here, and in the next few hours, it is gone! Wherever it goes, it kills fish and other wildlife living in water, suffocating it for lack of oxygen.

The teaching of Jesus went beyond popular thinking and challenged common behaviour. Last Sunday in the parable of the Sower, the planter scattered seed even among bushes and on patches of rock, which, in our thinking was an irresponsible way of farming.

In his teaching today, Jesus is talking about something really very bad, namely a darnel among wheat. But he, as the owner of the field, he surprises us even further by saying: "*let them both grow*" to warn us about the perpetual existence of evil in the world.

Where does evil come from, and what is its destiny? Finding a bad weed in the field among crops, would appear normal, but the source of this weed and how to deal with it, is what is extraordinary. First, an enemy planted the bad seed. God did not create evil, it does not have God as its source. Jesus did not establish a sinful church, but sin is present inside the church. Our parents did not give birth to bad children, it is something that comes later. So Jesus teaches us that there is evil in the world, in the church, in our countries and in the societies in which we live. Jesus does not promise us that we shall wake up one day to a world without sin, (let them both grow) but he assures us that the destiny of good and evil will not be the same. (first collect the darned and tie it in bundles to be burnt, then gather the wheat into my barns).

This statement assures us that while good and evil will live side by side, their destiny is different, evil will not prevail. Yes, it will seem to overwhelm us, and evil people will tend to prosper, but according to the teaching of Jesus, their destiny on the day of judgement will be different. We must do our best to persevere in goodness, and not be distracted by evil that goes on in the world.

There is something we need to look at: Jesus said "an enemy came and planted the darnel". Who is that enemy? Of course, it is anyone who could be intent on causing trouble. The question is: "Am I the cause of division in the family, the cause of scandal in the church or the reason why things are not working out for the good of the family, the society or of the church? We must do our best to make sure that we are not the sources of evil and sufferings of other people.

There is a lot of sufferings in the world, alas may none of us be its deliberate cause. While Divine attitude is essentially patient to an extent that God can let evil exist side by side with goodness, his anger might not be escaped unless we repent.



### **Gospel Reflection**

The divine teaching that God has care for us, continues in the three parables that Jesus tells in the Gospel today. Each describes the emergence of the kingdom of God from the seeds sown by His works and preaching. The kingdom's growth is hidden like the working of yeast in bread; it's improbable, unexpected, as in the way the tall mustard tree grows from the smallest of seeds.

As we sing in today's Psalm, God is slow to anger and abounding in kindness. He is just, Jesus assures us—evildoers and those who cause others to sin will be thrown into the fiery furnace at the end of the age. But by His patience God is teaching us that above all He desires repentance and the gathering of all nations to worship Him and to glorify His name.

Reflect, today, upon your sacred duty to be vigilant and constantly on the lookout for the seed of error sown within our world, the Church and your own soul. Vigilance is key. The evil one is always on the prowl. If we are to learn one of the central messages of this parable, then we must learn to guard and protect all that God has revealed and hold firmly to the Truth alone.
