#### DIFFICULTIES OF LIFE ARE NOT SIGNS THAT JESUS HAS ABANDONED YOU

The story of the events that took place on the dusty winding road to Emmaus, that we have just heard, is reported only by Luke, not by any other Gospel writer. There is a possibility that the early Christians felt so ashamed to report it because it would show their own resistance to accept the story brought by the women concerning the appearance of the risen Lord. The resurrection from the dead, was not a simple thing to accept. It was something for the future not for now. Jesus knew that the resurrection was not something of human experience, therefore, he appeared to his disciples to prove to them that it was him indeed.

Today we are given the story of two discouraged disciples, secretly walking away out of Jerusalem in the evening with their faces downcast. They were walking away, leaving behind them, a city that had ended their hopes. Inside its walls, their leader had been put to death by crucifixion. Their disappointment is expressed in the statement: "our own hope had been that he would be the one to set Israel free." It was a crushing defeat! Along the way, a stranger walks a bit faster catches up with them, and joined them. He was knowledgeable about the Law of Moses, and the Prophets. He seemed to give them new hope. But this made no impact because they did not share their feelings with each other as they walked along. Faith is not private, it must be shared in order to bring about the goodness in us.

Jesus did not make public spectacle of his risen presence. In the garden, the women thought that he was a gardener, at the lake, the fishermen seeing him walk on water, thought it was a ghost and in the Upper room in the presence of Thomas, he presented himself as a tortured man with wounds and scars of the crucifixion.

Again faith is a journey we have to make. This journey is supported by the Lord's own presence in our life. He walks along with us every moment Jesus is with us. Few days ago, I said to you that, all of us will have a Good Friday, but we should never lose sight of the dawn of Easter.

Today we are reminded, that at one time we shall, like the two disciples, take the journey with uncertain future but we should not forget the vigour, the energy we might have on our way back. At one time, like St. Paul we will take to the road to Damascus determined to do something really nasty, but we must not forget that only God knows and has power to determine in which form we shall reach our destination.

As you return home today, remember that the Lord is always with you. Take this words to you seriously and personally. The early Christians built their lives on the word that was preached to them, on Brotherhood and on the Breaking of Bread. Our life will be transformed and our fear of darkness will be dispelled if we build it on these three acts of the risen Lord.

Beware to get rid of that "thing", "something" that prevents us to recognise the Lord in our life. What could that be? This is an answer that we can give individually.

### **Gospel Reflection**

The readings for the 3rd Sunday in Easter for Year A encourage us to truly walk the path of discipleship. In the first reading Peter boldly proclaims the Good News. The psalm reminds us that God will guide us along the path of life. The second reading explains that Jesus Christ died so we could have new life. And in the gospel, two disciples encounter the risen Jesus on the road to Emmaus. In the Gospel, Jesus revealed himself to the disciples in the breaking of the bread. This theme emphasizes the importance of the Eucharist, and that Jesus is truly present in the bread and wine of the Eucharistic celebration. We come together to share in the Eucharistic celebration, to remember the sacrifice of Jesus, and to be nourished by his presence in the bread and wine. We are not called to follow Jesus alone, but to be part of a community of believers who support and encourage one another in our faith. Being a disciple of Jesus involves a lifelong journey of learning, service, and devotion.

While appreciating all vocations, the Church concentrates her attention on raising up shepherds for God's people - vocations to Holy Orders (the priesthood and diaconate) and to the religious life - while encouraging all who are discerning their vocation to pray more earnestly that they may hear and respond to God's call.
