Parish Newsletter- PENTECOST SUNDAY — 9th to 16th June 2019 PENTECOST STARTS WHEN SOMEONE NEXT TO YOU IN CHURCH IS DIFFERENT.

I wrote this reflection from Rome at the Venerable English College Villa Palazzola in the beautiful mountains on the outskirts of the city. Just in front of me was a crater Lake Albano and the other side was Castello Gondolfo the summer residence of the Pope. It was breakfast time and I could see smoke coming from the Pope's kitchen. I hopefully waited to be invited for breakfast; who knows, miracles do happen.

We were about 40 priests here all from Birmingham. As we prayed on June 3rd in the morning, the bishop mentioned with great veneration the Ugandan Martyrs. He praised their heroism although he had never been to Uganda and he called upon us all to imitate their fidelity. A thought immediately passed my mind concerning what has made the Church to be strong and to survive more than 2000 years of history. It is this: the Church has accepted the fact of being different yet remaining the same. Judaism has remained a minority because it does not admit differences. Christianity on the contrary spread and grew because it accepted and admitted those who were from 'the other side'. We venerated the Martyrs of Uganda not because they belonged to our nation, to our race or to our languages but because we recognise that in Christ God has made us into one family and from this family he makes saints. This is what the first Pentecost did. Pentecost is not an event of the past, it is of the present too. People from the known world were all united in praising God. When the Church started on Pentecost day it was meant to incorporate everyone; a family where every person felt at home. The differences between us are the cause for our strength as long as we confess the same Jesus, profess the same faith proclaimed by the apostles on Pentecost day and put into our daily life the living traditions of the Church. Any teaching that conflicts with what the church has believed and taught right from apostolic time cannot be authentic no matter how popular it may become.

Some people are not very comfortable to see 'other' people in the Church. Some might feel upset when turning up for the Sunday Mass they find that their seat is taken up by someone else, worse still some people might see the coming of many new people in their parish church as an 'invasion or take over'. Christians with such thoughts have never experienced Pentecost and parishes whose members think that they can carry on as their fore father's did without the interference of others are just moving to the direction of slow death.

Our Parish of St. Mary's ought to remain a place where every person is welcome, where varieties of gifts are appreciated and encouraged for the building up of the body of Christ the church. Nobody is more worthy to be here and no body should feel unworthy to be here. We are all beloved disciples and children of God. Each language, each tribe and each tongue is beautiful because God uses it to communicate and to proclaim his marvels.

If you come to church today and you notice that the person sitting next to you is different, remember that Pentecost has overtaken you. Let us raise our voices to sing the marvels of God.

YOU ARE MOST WELCOME to our Parish Church. If it is your first time here or probably you have been here before, your presence with us at this moment at our community worship is greatly appreciated. Our Parish Church is the second to be built in Coventry after the Protestant Reformation. It was built in 1893, the pews have never moved since then! Our Musical Pipe Organ was inaugurated in 1898, it was the best of its kind at the time. Our Parish has had eleven Parish priests since 1889, the present one being a Religious Missionary from the Institute of Apostles of Jesus in Uganda. Our Parish welcomes and promotes the initiatives taken by everyone for the building up and sustenance of our faith community.
