MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE

<u>Parish Family Thanksgiving Day:</u> will be celebrated on August 28th 2022. It will be a parish get together to thank God for whatever he has given to us especially after the Covid 19 pandemic. I'm sure that you have something to thank God for as a person and as an individual. We shall start with celebration of the Sacrifice of the Mass and proceed to the parish garden to have lunch together and some entertainments.

Gift Aid helps our parish to thrive: it is a way of increasing your charitable Sunday donation to the parish at no extra cost to you. It is a government approved scheme that allows charities to reclaim tax on a donation made by a UK taxpayer. The parish can claim back from the HMRC 25p for every £1 you donate. If you give a weekly income of £5.00 without gift Aid it remains £5.00 but with Gift Aid it becomes £6.25. and if your weekly donation is £20.00 with Gift Aid it becomes £25.00 because the government gives back to the Church £0.25 on every pound you donate. Sign up today with Sr. Leera our G.A assistant.

The paradox of abundance: over 800 million people go hungry each day. Yet the world produces over 4 billion tonnes of food and we only need 3.7 billion tonnes to feed everyone. From all this food produced, a third is wasted. St John Paul II called this 'the paradox of abundance.' Clearly the currently global food system is not working. But as Pope Francis said, "Each of us has a role to play in transforming food systems for the benefit of people and the planet." Let's respond to his call! Returning to Mass at Pentecost: on Friday 6th May 2022, the Catholic Bishops of England and Wales reinstated the Sunday Obligation. A beautiful hallmark of the Catholic faith is the profound desire to participate in the Holy Mass and share in the Eucharist. We do so with deep gratitude and joy. The Eucharist gives the Church her identity - "The Eucharist makes the Church, and the Church makes the Eucharist." It enables us to worship God, to support each other on our journey of faith, and to be a visible sign of faith in the world. This hallmark is supported and strengthened by the precept that our fundamental Christian duty is to worship God by participating in the celebration of Mass. Attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days is the greatest of all privileges, sometimes referred to as "the Sunday Obligation."

Since the Covid pandemic, until the present time, we have shared with you our judgment that the situation of the last two years has meant that the Sunday Obligation has been impeded and has needed to be fulfilled in other ways. We thank God that this situation has now changed. The pressing challenges of the pandemic have lessened significantly. Most people have resumed the wide range of normal activities, not restricted by the previous Covid measures. We therefore believe that the reasons which have prevented Catholics from attending Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation no longer apply. "Virtual viewing" of Mass online does not fulfil the Sunday Obligation. It may, however, be a source of continual spiritual comfort to those who cannot attend Mass in person, for example those who are elderly and sick, for whom the obligation does not apply.
