WHAT A SAD WORLD WE LIVE IN?

At the time of Jesus, the Roman rule over Palestine was exercised with an iron feast. The religious leaders of the people were always worried that if the people did not keep the peace, the Romans would come and destroy not only the rebellious people but the temple and the whole nation if they wished (Jn. 11:50). Such was the might of Rome. It was within this oppressive mechanism that Jesus taught the unbelievable: "Love your enemies, pray for those who persecute you, treat others as you would like them to treat you" (Matt 5:44, Lk 6:31). We have come to know this as the 'Golden Rule'. This teaching applies to every human person, but Christians must do some extra work.

All of us from time to time do receive calls from people who try to sell things to us. Some of these calls are annoying, but it would be unchristian to abuse, or to bang the phone against the caller as if he/she had committed a crime. Some people go to the extent to verbally show disrespect to the caller. It tells a sad world the receiver of the call lives in. I mean the interior world of the soul. Most of these callers are young people trying to find permanent jobs or who might be at their ever first job. I urge you to be considerate to people of this kind.

Priests too are not spared. You call a particular number to inquire about one of your sick and housebound parishioners; before you tell who you are, the person on the other end is already verbally attacking you thinking that you were going to sell to them something. For other people once you tell them that you are a priest, they just stop the phone; if you are lucky they will tell you that it is a wrong number when it is not. Other people bang the phone just because the accent is not the one they expected. This kind of behaviour is not good especially for us Christians. I'm sure Jesus Christ finds it very difficult to talk to such people since he has a foreign accent

The respect we give to the people we know ought to be extended above all to the people we do not know. It does not make me a good person to greet you with charm and cheer on the face after someone has introduced you to me when I had ignored you in the first place. Loving the stranger shows an overflow of your love of God. Christian ethics demands that we be courteous in behaviour and in speech particularly when we are talking on the phone. Listen first before you speak because you do not know who is calling you and why!

YOU ARE MOST WELCOME to our Parish Church. If it is your first time here or probably you have been here before, your presence with us at this moment at our community worship is greatly appreciated. Our Parish Church is the second to be built in Coventry after the Protestant Reformation. It was built in 1893, the pews have never moved since then! Our Musical Pipe Organ was inaugurated in 1898, it was the best of its kind at the time. Our Parish has had eleven Parish priests since 1889, the present one being a Religious Missionary from the Institute of Apostles of Jesus in Uganda. Our Parish welcomes and promotes the initiatives taken by everyone for the building up and sustenance of our faith community.

<u>Victims of Human trafficking</u> Thursday 8th February is the Feast Day of St Josephine Bakhita –a Sudanese girl the patron saint of victims of modern slavery and human trafficking. Catholics are encouraged to pray for all those affected by this crime of modern slavery and the people that volunteer to eradicate this crime. This year, the focus is on those who are caught up in forced labour and labour exploitation in the UK.

St Josephine Bakhita, also known as 'Mother Moretta' (our Black Mother) bore 144 physical scars throughout her life which were received after she was kidnapped at the age of nine in Sudan and sold into slavery. Such was the trauma that she forgot her birth name. Her kidnappers gave her the name Bakhita meaning 'fortunate'. She experienced the moral and physical abuse associated with slavery. In 1882 she was bought for the Italian in Consul Sudan. Later, another Italian family bought her where she received from her masters, kindness, respect, peace and joy.

The new owner entrusted her to the Canossian Sisters of the Institute of the Catechumens in Venice. It was there that Bakhita came to know about God whom, 'she had experienced in her heart without knowing who He was' since she was a child. She was received into the Catholic Church in 1890, joining the Nuns and made her final profession in 1896. The next fifty years of her life were spent witnessing to God's love through cooking, sewing, embroidery and attending to the door. When she was on door duty, she would gently lay her hands on the heads of the children who attended the nearby school and caress them. A godless society like ours today would probably disapprove of that. Surrounded by the Nuns, she died on 8 February 1947. Let us remember so many people who suffer the tragedy of human trafficking.
