THIS IS WHAT TRULY CHANGED THE WORLD

The resurrection of Jesus has massive implications. Everybody dies but only One had the power to raise himself from the dead. The resurrection of Jesus is the linchpin that holds everything together. It is the Christian faith's cornerstone; without which the building collapses. The resurrection of Jesus is what changed the world and gave mankind unending hope. I will not be surprised if you told me that you have come across people who throw doubt on the resurrection. They are not the first. In the early Church when the first Christians especially Paul had preached the gospel about the resurrection and moved on, some spurious preachers descended on Corinth and preached a gospel contrary to Paul's. He fought them not by attacking them but by reminding the Christians of Corinth the gospel he had preached to them.

Brothers I want to remind you the gospel I preached, the gospel that you received and in which you are firmly established, because the gospel will save you if you keep believing exactly what I preached to you. Believing anything else will not lead to anything.

But Christ has in fact been raised from the dead, the first fruit of all who have fallen asleep..... If this were not true what do people hope to gain by being baptised for the dead (Christ)? If the dead are not going to be raised why be baptised on their behalf? What about ourselves? Why are we living under constant threat? Never give in , never admit defeat, keep on working at the Lords work always knowing hat in the Lord you cannot be labouring in vain. 1Cor. 15.

Matters of importance

Good Friday Liturgy at St. Osburgs and St. Marys started at 3:00pm with the celebration of the Stations of the Cross and were followed immediately by the celebration of the Passion of the Lord. It was the first time that this was done at St. Osburgs but quite an old custom now at St. Mary's. The reason for this is to follow the sequence of events. During Lent we heard about the mounting pressure the Pharisees and High priest put on Jesus. He was arrested and passed on to several authorities namely the High Priest Caiaphas, to the Roman Governor Pilate, to the puppet Jewish King Herod then to Pilate again until he was finally condemned to death on the cross.

The celebration of the Stations of the Cross and narration of the Passion of the Lord follows the sequence of events. Moreover if the Passion story ends on Good Friday by telling us that Jesus is buried, there is no need to start the Stations of the Cross at a later hour of the day.

On a very practical level if you had 200 people at the celebration of the Lord's Passion, it does not give much sense when only 12 people can return later for the Stations of the Cross. For some Catholics the Stations of the Cross is long forgotten. Many will see it as something new and strange. After the Passion of the Lord, no other liturgy is celebrated in the church. Total silence reigns over the whole world as the church waits at the Lord's tomb in prayer and fasting meditating on his passion and death, his decent into hell and awaiting his resurrection. It is very important to get our liturgical discipline right.

Recommissioned Eucharistic Ministers: I would like to congratulate and to thank those members of our Christian community who were recommissioned as extraordinary ministers of the Eucharist among us on Maundy Thursday. Thanks you for accepting to undertake this sacred ministry. God has called you for a sacred service among his people.

The General Instruction to the Roman Missal states that "In every celebration of the Eucharist, there should be a sufficient number of ministers of Holy Communion so that it may be distributed in a reverent and orderly manner. Bishops, priests and deacons distribute Holy Communion in virtue of their office as ordinary ministers of the Body and Blood of the Lord. When the size of the congregation or the incapacity of the bishop, priest, or deacon requires it, the celebrant may be assisted by other bishops, priests, or deacons. If such ordinary ministers of Holy Communion are not present, "the priest may call upon extraordinary ministers to assist him, i.e., duly instituted acolytes or even other faithful who have been deputed for this purpose. In case of necessity, the priest may also depute suitable faithful for this single occasion (GIRM 162)." May God bless your ministry among us.

Fr Joseph Kyeyune AJ returns to Uganda on 3rd April. He has been of such great help to me during this busy time. We wish him a safe return to our mission if it is God's will.
