

To balance these two is the reason for the work that I have commissioned to be undertaken for the safety of our priests.

As we enter the col season, please make it a good habit to close the door when you come to church and when you leave. If we keep the church warm, we shall be comfortable. Remember that that little heat which escapes if the door is left open has cost money. Don't waste it.

ARE FIREWORKS RELEVANT ANY MORE?

I'm sure the bonfire night caused you more disturbance than amusement. The day after the blasts, I remember meeting an elderly couple who were so distressed by the noise that kept them awake all night. In the past, fireworks were meant to celebrate something, an event of victory. There was of course a flavour of triumphalism. But these days, fireworks can be used by undisciplined jobs who simply take it as an occasion to disturb their neighbours. As a result, the balance between those who want to enjoy them and others who want a quiet night is zero. It seems to be getting worse every year. I remember someone from the neighbourhood who was blasting huge explosions over my house as though I was in his/her firing line. Two of these explosions were more annoying than entertaining. One went off at 2:00am and the other one at 4:00am. You can wonder whatever was going on in someone's' head over night to make such isolated blasts at odd hours!

In our city, New Year's Eve, Guy Fawkes night, Diwali and Chinese New Year, tend to be the events that evoke blasts, you can imagine how upsetting it must be for people who might be woken up, animals which must be seriously distressed, and poor birds in the trees which have to fly all night from one place to another in search of some quiet.

We thank God that many people below 60 have not seen war. For some of these people the explosive noise made by the fireworks is like music in their ears; but for some people like myself who have witnessed what explosive devices can do the sound made by fireworks brings about the sad memories. Bombs and grenades make similar sounds as fireworks, the only difference is that one sound is to entertain and the other is to cause fear and death! I'm sure that in places where these explosive devices go off people are fearful of their lives. Children who live in situations of war would be horrified to come across people who entertain themselves on bomb-like explosive fireworks.

Christians who practice the faith need to evaluate the relevance of blasting fireworks. There are those also who are ignorant of the history of these annual blasts. At this time of seeking unity and ecumenical cooperation is it still relevant to blast these devices? Secondly, for the sake of those people who live in war areas where bombs take the lives of their dear ones everyday, would it not be better and a duty of every person to be in solidarity with these people, other than entertaining themselves with explosives whose sound is similar to those devices that take the lives of their dear ones?

Love your neighbour as yourself. A Christian should wish to see his neighbour having a good night sleep. He should also be pleased that his neighbour's dog is not scared to death because of the noise the fireworks is making. We should think of others first before we indulge ourselves. Christian charity ought to penetrate every aspect of our actions if we who profess it are to make a difference.
